# Chairman's Message

Recently I mentioned that change happens and when it does it is necessary to cope with the effects. Maybe the latest event has fallen upon us from an unexpected source which will necessitate quite a change in our thinking.

One of our suppliers - Optimus projectiles - has chosen to make their product available direct from their premises rather than through the NRAA/State Association channels.

The sale of projectiles and ammunition has been the cornerstone of the finances of the target shooting operations. If that is undermined - and the NRAA is to maintain its function in parallel with State Associations - then a shift will need to be made to an increase in affiliation fees to compensate for the shortfall in revenue raised from the sale of ammunition and components. As an estimate, such fees may need to rise by \$20 per shooter. This would be offset by the supposedly lower ammunition costs.

Should we be forced down this path it is my prediction that the cost of projectiles and ammunition will rise in price as perhaps other suppliers follow the Optimus example. At present both projectiles and ammunition are purchased in large quantities, enabling a reduction in price. A similar move for an expansion in the range of propellants may have a similar untoward effect.

Rifle shooting will continue; we won't be "rooned" as Hanrahan would predict. Please be aware that after providing Optimus with a financially rewarding contract for a year, that organisation has chosen to bite the hand that feeds it. There are three major projectile suppliers especially for target rifle shooters and not all shooters purchase a projectile based on price. Performance is high on the requirements of shooters.

Recently the NRAA received an outstanding submission in relation to the encouragement and conduct of Under 25 teams from Andrew Sims. He is prepared to drive the concept, including all aspects of team shooting. In time, this may extend to F Class teams as well.

The Under 25 team that has recently returned from competition in South Africa showed its mettle by winning the Junior Australia Match at Bloemfontein.

The final elimination to enable selection of the two competitors in the Commonwealth Games in 2018 will precede the NRAA Championships. After two full series of matches the initial 30 competitors has been reduced to 10 shooters. After the two day series, the top five names will be presented to Shooting Australia for final selection purposes.

Rifle shooting remains a safe and enjoyable sport in which we can all compete. Enjoy the opportunities you have to do so at any level.

# ASAPS - Advancing Shooting as A Positive Sport

The previous six articles, spanning 12 months have tried to alert all members to the steady decline in membership, and have been aimed at State Associations and club leaders in an attempt to raise people's consciousness to the point that some positive action to attract new members and to retain them as well as existing members has taken place.

This article is a summary of previous findings, and a call to arms!

The articles began by illustrating clearly the National, and State-by-State figures for the years 2001-2016. In a couple of instances membership is heading in the right direction. In others – not so!

#### Look to the Future:

If you are in a club or association that seems satisfied

If you retain 95% of members without adding new ones each year, you will have lost more than one third by year eight. If you retain 90% per year, you will have lost 30% plus by year four.

In successive articles, research findings of what works for clubs were presented, and several examples of successful programs currently being used that have proven to be successful were cited. Has your club taken up any of these ideas and given them a try?

#### **Develop a Positive Club Culture:**

The issue of retaining members has also been looked at, again with practical suggestions for clubs to engage existing and new members. Remember, there's no point in getting people through the front door if the back door is wide open. New members drift away through lack of follow-up of visitors. How many clubs listen to new members? Does your club have a mechanism for feedback from members? Do State Associations or clubs actually evaluate how they are running? Does yours?

#### **Broaden Your Horizons:**

Proactive clubs that offer a diverse range of disciplines are seen to be thriving. Those that sit back and wait for members to appear on the range, and then hope they come back, don't. Simple, really.

The 'good old days' of cheap ammo and cheap basic equipment have gone. The reality is that the old style shooter is being replaced with a group who are more demanding - typically one who wants to embrace one of the F Class disciplines or else are Field or Service enthusiasts.

Can your club cope with and cater for this 'new' shooter? Does it? Previous articles have advocated opening up our sport more to Field and Service enthusiasts. There are a great many of them out there - all are prospective new members. Associations and clubs need to embrace change. Try having different disciplines on alternating weeks if mid-week shooting is not viable. Think outside the box.

Remember the power of advertising and public exposure of your club's activities via the local media. Does your club have a Publicity Officer? Determine to market your club and the sport better.

#### **Co-operative Clubs:**

You can keep your club healthy and vibrant by being

personally involved. Research shows that where job rosters operate, people are more inclined to enjoy the club's activities, take ownership and bring new members. Alternatively, if a club relies on the usual five percent of members to run the club and therefore, have to turn up to everything, it runs the real risk of them becoming disillusioned or tired out, or sick of criticism. Everyone needs to step up and take some responsibility for the running of the club. Being a participating member has enormous rewards.

Membership fees are currently due and within a few weeks the numbers will be in. Whether or not this series of articles have made any difference will be evident. Hopefully, when the next set of graphs is completed, there will be a positive result.

#### Finally: a Parable.

In the 9th Century in northern China, a heavy and valuable bronze bell sank into a river during transport. Engineers' efforts to raise it failed due to its weight. Several years later, a priest named Lu Mei Shujen sought permission to raise the bell, with the proviso that if successful the bell would reside in a local temple.

Given permission, Lu Mei Shujen instructed his assistants to cut and gather an immense number of bamboo rods. These are hollow, light and practically unsinkable. These rods were taken down to the bell by divers and one by one attached to the bell.

After many thousands of rods had been attached, the bell slowly began to shift, then move due to the accumulated buoyancy of the bamboo rods. The bell was floated, then retrieved and placed in the local temple.

The point being, that each individual rod had an imperceptible impact, but in the final scheme of things, each rod's efforts, working with the others, collectively made a difference and a positive result.

# The Australian Rifle Team in New Zealand and South Africa

In preparation for the tour to South Africa, the Australian Open Rifle Team travelled to Trentham, New Zealand for a test match against the Kiwis. The World Long Range Championships will be held there in 2019 and this gave the team members an opportunity to get to experience "windy" Trentham.

Australia got off to a good start at 300 yards and slowly built on the lead at every range. Australia won the New Zealand Match by 35 points for only the second time.

The Australians dominated the individual New Zealand championships. Duncan Davis won the Macefield lead up followed by Darren Enslin and Jim Bailey in third place. Our two coaches Jim and Steve went into the finals of the Ballinger Belt series 10 points ahead of the field, demonstrating their ability to pick through the very testing conditions. Jim shot a solid 75.9 in the final to win his ride in the chair and quoted his famous quip in his winner's speech...." I'm back baby". Steve Negus was in second place, two points behind.

In the New Zealand Championships Australia took all

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


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three top spots: first Jim Bailey, second Steve Negus and third Duncan Davis.

Jim Bailey also won the long range aggregate, followed again by Steve. The short range aggregate was won by Geoff Grenfell followed by David Black and Matt Pozzebon.

The Open Australian Target Rifle Team and Under 25 team travelled to Bloemfontein, South Africa in March this year to compete in the Australia Match, Protea match and as individuals in the South African Championships. The Gen. De Wet range is situated approximately 5000 feet above sea level and is an open exposed range showing good mirage; with a resident Red Hartebeest and herd of Springbok that constantly interrupt the day's shooting programme. The two week event was filled with at least three individual shoots (Bisley style) and a couple of teams ranges per day and can be likened to a "shooting marathon". Great Britain (GB), the United States of America (USA) and Canada also sent teams to compete.

Individually the Australians demonstrated their talent with four trophies won outright.

Matt Pozzebon won the Dave Smith Cup, Donna Negus won the Scottish Sword and Norma Seyferdt (Top Lady) and Jim Bailey won the Long Range Aggregate.


In the State Presidents (our Queens equivalent), the GB captain Nick Tremlett won the ride in the chair to a disappointed Geoff Grenfell finishing fourth and David Black finishing seventh just a point behind but four v's more than the winner. Under 25 Chris Schwebel demonstrated his up and coming




Matt Pozz and David Smith - Matt won the Dave Smith trophy

talent, two points behind the winner; placing 12th. Jim Bailey took fifth place in the Grand Aggregate and in the South African Championships we had five in the top 15: J Bailey third, G Grenfell ninth, M Pozzebon 12th, D Black 13th and S Negus 14th.

In the Open Australia Match, Great Britain went into the 900 metres with a five-point lead over Australia

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Specialist in Commercial Motor, Heavy Motor/Plant, Rural, Small Business and Aviation however GB waited patiently to capitalise on a less fluctuating wind pattern and shot fast and accurately, to win eventually by 26 points over Australia. South Africa came third, 10 points behind Australia and the USA came fourth, 69 points behind South Africa.

The Australian Under 25's made history by winning the U25 Australia Match over the favourites Great Britain by two points and three centres. Australia last won this match in 2005. The team comprised: Captain – Dean Enslin (QLD), Coach – Chris Schwebel, (NSW) Manager – Andrew Sims (NSW) with shooters: Dean Enslin, Alex Davies (NSW), Nick Sims (NSW), David Smith (NSW) and Angus Martin (NSW). The South Africans finished third and Canada fourth.

The RSA international match was shot and used primarily as a practice for the open teams and resulted in GB in first place followed by RSA Australia and USA.

However, the RSA Under 25 International match was hotly contested for and was won by the Australian U25's followed again by GB RSA and Canada.

In the Open Protea Match, Australia took the lead by five points at 300 metres. After the 600 metres, the scores between GB and Australia were level and two in front of RSA, however the 900 metres was to be Australia's Achilles heel once again, allowing GB to win by 14 points. RSA came in second, two points ahead of Australia and the USA came fourth, 50 points behind Australia.

The Protea Under 25 Match went down to the wire once again with the Australian U25's making the Trifecta complete with a three-point win over GB. RSA

and Canada were in third and fourth places respectively.

Dean and Darren made history by being the first father and son to captain their respective teams at the same time in Target Rifle Shooting Australia. The two captains will pair up again for the World Long Range Championships to be held in New Zealand in January 2018. The first trial will be held later this year.

In the sport of Target Rifle Shooting, The Australia Match and the World Championships are the only times where a Team Member can officially wear the Prestigious Australian Coat of Arms.

F Class Queens winners were Darren Bradley in F Standard A with his daughter, Jacinta absolutely "thumping" the competition in F Standard B.



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

#### NRAA F Class National Teams South Australia

A total of 18 F Class Teams competed at Lower Light in the NRAA National Teams Match.

These comprised seven FTR teams, six F Open teams and five F Standard teams. This was the sixth match since the competition started in 2009 which was held at Bendigo Victoria, where at that match seven F Standard teams and two F Open teams entered.

This year the format of the match was changed and match one was 20 shots at 900 metres with match two 15 shots at 700, 800 and 900 metres.

A good percentage of the Australian F Open and FTR teams were present, as they had recently had a full training session at the Kapunda Range, about an hour away from Lower Light.

The conditions at Lower Light are always challenging, and the South Australian organisers are to be congratulated for the way they presented the range and all the facilities. Many people took advantage of the new accommodation units available. Ample caravan space was provided and most also used the excellent dining facilities also available.

Lower Light put on its usual tricky wind conditions for the two days and kept all the coaches on their toes.



# Connected to the Grid



"There's a way to do it better - find it." - Thomas A Edison Somewhat unexpectedly at the end of 2016, Ipswich and District Rifle Club embarked on a quest to power their club house. About seven years earlier the Club had a tilt at securing grant funding to connect to the grid.


There were a few issues which proved to hinder the progress - the main being expense. Our club house was a considerable distance from grid infrastructure and the rising electricity prices would be hard to manage for our little club anyway. The only option would be off the grid. The club was fortunate to acquire by generous donation seven near new solar panels; the foundation of the project. Suddenly it seemed power was within reach. Photovoltaic panels were one thing but to survive off grid we would need power storage and a charging system. Typically, these were very accessible and a 24v system using deep cycle lead acid batteries seemed the logical solution. Little did I expect a conversation over Christmas lunch would open the door to a better way. It was December 25 and the constant drizzle made the





middle of summer unexpectedly comfortable; otherwise it was a fairly standard family Christmas. The day was full of good times together and the opportunity to catch up with those you hadn't seen for a while; 'How's it going?', 'Whatch'a been up to?' It was my Uncle Chris' answer to the latter which had my ears prick. 'Actually, I'm into this new business; Lithium Battery Systems.' The more he told me the more the gears turned - this sounds like what we need for the clubhouse I thought. He told me all about the Brisbane business and their superior product. He explained that he was working with talented electrical engineers who'd been working in the industry for years. Their product was 12v lithium iron phosphate batteries designed to replace deep cycle lead acid batteries for off grid power in motor homes, caravans, boats, etc. They ordered top quality battery cells from China (like everything...) and built them in series supported by their locally designed and manufactured battery management system (bms). The product was then encased in robust aluminium housing.





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### Does Target Rifle Shooting Have a Death Wish?

Target shooting, like many traditional sports is slowly declining either in absolute numbers or in relative terms as a percentage of the population. We all struggle with this question, but in our case, is this decline preventable or reversible? I believe the rifle shooting movement has made many initiatives such as introducing, Eagle eyes, F Class, F Open, electronic targets etc. that have postponed the decline and enlivened the sport. However, I think that some of the changes, have had unintended consequences that have made it more difficult for the sport to survive.

In fact, I think target rifle in particular is facing a "Kodak Moment" and if we don't adapt to change we will die.

I have been thinking about what we can do to make shooting easier for newcomers and casual shooters like me, for some time. It seems to me that shooting has the great advantage that one can shoot as long as you can stand up and remember your name. On the other hand, for a new shooter, getting established is much more difficult than it used to be. Some of this is tighter gun laws but most of it is our own doing.

Some random information I have come across over the last few years:

- I read a story in a United States newspaper that paint ball shooting had declined 30% in two or three years. It seemed that the cause had been that the enthusiast players had introduced high performance paint ball guns (with much higher prices) so that newcomers and less dedicated players could not compete, thus competitions declined because only the most committed people with plenty of cash could compete.
- I went to a come and try day at a shotgun range. I discovered
- a. that almost all shooters use factory ammunition and because there is a large market, the price differential between reloads and new was relatively small. This meant that even though there was an apparent price premium for everyone, competition was enhanced because everyone was on an equal playing field.

- b. Shotguns are relatively cheap and readily available so that if a new shooter wants to get his own gear he can order a new gun and be fully set up within a month
- c. Shotgunners spent almost all their time either shooting or socialising with other shooters. They usually don't spend time and money loading ammunition, testing loads or playing with all sorts of arcane gun smithing variables.
- d. The cost of a complete trap shooting kit that is good enough for most shooters is around \$3,000-\$3,500.
- I was speaking to someone from one rifle club who told me that when newcomers came to the club, the club gave them a sheet detailing all the costs. The people read it and never returned. Clearly this was an unsuccessful recruiting strategy.
- I went to a prize meeting recently where there was only one entrant in A Grade target rifle.
- Some years ago, I spoke to a new shooter who
  was relatively young and he explained that he
  skipped target rifle and went straight to F Class as
  it was cheaper, (no jacket, no spotting scope and the
  telescopic sight was about the same cost as a full set
  of aperture sights).
- I went to a rifle range in Switzerland where I was made very welcome and lent gear by three different people. Like everyone else there, I bought factory ammunition and shot under the same conditions.
- There is a move on at the IOC to remove the 50 metre prone match from the program because it is viewed as technology dominant rather than skill dominant. If that is the case in smallbore it is far more so in fullbore.

Thinking about these issues, I feel we have made it too difficult to get into the sport and then it is a daunting task for a new shooter to work out whether his lack of performance is due to ammunition, rifle or technique. Finally, for young shooters who generally work more hours and are more likely to be involved with children's

The benefit of lithium batteries was extraordinary. Like in your mobile phone lithium batteries are a feather in comparison to the lead acid alternative. Unlike lead acid batteries which can only be used down to 30% from full charge, lithium batteries have a depth of discharge of around 70%. Lithium batteries also supply a much higher flow of amps to keep high draw appliances like a kettle or microwave from overloading the system. Just like a cordless drill, with the right charging set up lithium batteries can be charged to capacity in a fraction of the time of alternatives. As though all of this wasn't good enough, Lithium batteries can last three times the charging cycles of the standard lead acid battery. What a product! The only possible downside would be the price. I left Christmas lunch with an LBS brochure and a head full of ideas. Lithium Batteries would be a terrific option for IDRC's clubhouse. I had to let the club know about this option. After one look at the LBS website the guys were keen to find out more. Early enquiries were responded to promptly. All technical questions were answered and two tailored systems were proposed to cater for our specific needs. The quotes we received were extremely competitive (about 1/10 of the price to connect to the grid). After selecting our preferred option, we placed an order with LBS. Within a few weeks the product was delivered and installed in a timely manner. Their after sales service was second to none. Our state of the art LBS battery system has been operating effectively for a couple of months now. We had a few minor issues in the first couple of months or so, which is to be expected. Since then the LBS system has been tweaked for optimum efficiency and it has easily met all of our expectations. With no ongoing costs, this system has proven to be the better way and I'm glad we found it. activities on Saturday than people of my generation, they don't have the time or money for reloading, ammunition testing etc.

Some Suggestions for Making the Sport More Approachable

- 1. Call for expressions of interest from firearms manufacturers to develop a standard rifle with a basic stock with adjustable cheek piece and simply adjustable butt plate which can achieve 200mm groups at 600 yards at a price goal of \$3,500 (including sights and hand stop). The NRAA or the larger state associations would guarantee to buy perhaps 20 units and keep at least five in stock so that a new shooter could have a rifle within two weeks of getting a permit to acquire.
- 2. Consider returning to the days of a limited number of actions or at least a maximum list price for a barrelled action.
- 3. Limit the range of grades and competitions. We probably need to choose between F Class and FTR or just return to the original F Class with a bipod fixed to the rifle and included in the weight. It may sound strange but I think F Open can be preserved as an experimental class so that every five years or so we can look at developments in that class and see what can be transferred to the standard classes.
- 4. Standardise ammunition in two phases:
- a. Limit the number of projectile variations to two

- or three so that any new projectile must displace another in the range with no more than a 12-month changeover in competition. A similar limit could be placed on brass, powder and primers.
- b. Return to standard ammunition for major competitions, just like Bisley and the Commonwealth Games. Tenders would be called from ammunition suppliers for one or two suppliers to supply all the ammunition for two years. Selection would be based on a combination of performance, price and guaranteed minimum stockholding.

While these changes might seem to increase costs. in other ways they can reduce costs by reducing the expenditure on load development and increasing the volumes and therefore lowering the costs for the key suppliers, including State Rifle Associations who are stuck with unmanageable stocks of components and sometimes almost unsaleable stock of suddenly unfashionable brands.

I have one more left field suggestion. Rather than any further reductions in target size, make A Grade competition shoot on F Class targets - then there will be no shoot-offs and 50.1 wouldn't beat 49.7 (56.x).

I hope that the evidence in the United Kingdom where participation is growing and Switzerland where shooting is more popular than golf, might persuade some to have another look at our sport.



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# Stawell's Big Bore Prize Meeting

Shooters from across Victoria, Mount Gambier and Broken Hill converged on Stawell for the Mother's Day weekend to compete in the Stawell Rifle Club's 64th Open, two-day Big Bore Prize Meeting.

The weather forecast was spot on, with near perfect conditions - all the A Grade squad achieved possibles first up at 500 yards, with solid scores achieved in the other six divisions.

Peter Maher, 50.7 took the lead in A Grade, one centre ahead of both Keirin McCamley and Mark Horsnell. Peter Setford was successful in B Grade with 49.4. two centres ahead of both Tony McRae and Doug Ratcliff. In C Grade Blade Lacey - our only Junior competitor, led off with 49.3 - one centre ahead of Dale Vanderhorst and a point ahead of Brian McKenna in third. In F Standard A Grade, John Simons led with 60.7 over Bruce Sergeant next with 60.6 and Grant Hornell on 60.5. Noel Osborn was a lonely, only entrant in F Standard B Grade and achieved 58.3.

In F Open Robert Bant, who was celebrating his 70th birthday, led with 59.4 over Bill Boyack by two centres and Paul McCarthy in third place. FTR saw Robert Chiswell win with 58.4 and Leo Stigger one centre behind, followed by Paul Murphy another centre down.

This year we avoided 300 yards and to compensate, scheduled 15 shot matches for 600 and 700 yards.

In A Grade at 600 yards, Ray Tapps punched out a 75.10 ahead of Peter Maher and Mark Horsnell, both on 74.9. B Grade winner was Tony McRae on 73.7, followed by Doug Ratcliff on 73.6 and Shannon Dyer on 73.5. Dale Vanderhorst in C Grade on 72.6 led Blade Lacey on 72.5 with Brian McKenna third with 71.4.

F Standard A Grade saw Daniel Sandford ahead with 88.8, Jason O'Rourke on 88.6 and Joe Melbourne next with 87.5. In F Standard B Grade it was Noel Osborn with 84.2.

F Open resulted in the 500 yard place getters in reverse order - Paul

#### New Range for 2017 WA Queens Prize

The Western Australian Queens Prize will return to Perth this September, to be held at the long anticipated and newly completed Pinjar range. Set amongst the backdrop of pine forest, the Pinjar range will play host to its first ever Duke of Edinburgh and Queens Prize to the tune of approximately 200 eager competitors.

Off the back of the 2015 and 2016 Queens Prize meets held and hosted by Albany Rifle Club, the new Pinjar range has big boots to fill. The Pinjar complex boasts a modern clubhouse that enjoys views of the range from the control room as well as a large, stainless steel commercial kitchen, bar and canteen, offices, a dedicated rifle cleaning room and function room - plus the WARA Shop operates from here.

The range itself has the capacity to accommodate 24 electronic targets per gallery, from 100 metres to 900 metres (1000 yards). These are housed in the purpose built Target Shed which dominates the south-east end of the complex. The range boasts a single firing point with staggered stop butts - so no more dragging gear from mound to mound!

Pinjar is approximately 42 kilometres from Perth CBD and is situated within the City of Wanneroo. With small garden farms located within the area, it makes for a lovely view on route to the range. However, if more shooting, V8 Supercars or motorbike riding is more your pace, there are the SSAA range, the Barbagello Raceway and motocross tracks located nearby.


For those looking to stay at the range during the Queens Prize, unpowered caravan bays will be available onsite. These must be booked at the time of nomination, prior to the competition. However,

# Easter Prize Meeting - 2017

The 2017 Easter SWDRA Easter Prize Meeting was attended by 50 marksmen and women from clubs across the state, ranging from Karratha, Leonora and Esperance, and marked the resumption of this competition following a two-year hiatus due to stop butt repairs. The weekend's shooting comprised the shooting of the Coolilup Cup; a one day competition over three ranges; followed by the South West DRA Open Championships over two days.

#### **Coolilup Cup**

Shot over 300, 500 and 600 metres, in fine but cloudy conditions, this year's Cup was won by multiple former winner, John Moore from Leonora, followed one point behind by target rifle shooter Mark Milentis of Manjimup. Busselton's Graham Oates took out the F Standard division, just 4 X's in front of Mal Hamilton of South Perth. F Open was won by Busselton shooter Brad Yates, a clear point ahead of Boddington's Bob Kinnear.

#### South West DRA Open Championship and Service Rifle

The South West DRA Open Championships is a two-day event,

fired over all distances from 300 metres – 900 metres. Visitors to the range would have noticed the warm and sunny skies accompanied by a pleasant light breeze. While these seemingly benign conditions appeared conducive to good shooting conditions, it was clear to the shooters on the mound that there was a very tricky mirage showing through the spotting scopes and telescopic sights. These

conditions tended to intensify as the day moved on, resulting in the mirage moving from left to right; right to left; and boiling; causing all shooters to read the conditions carefully and trust their judgement. Not surprisingly, there were many frustrated and disappointed shooters over the two days. Of course, the top scorers tended to be the more able condition readers who were also able to get shots away quickly in order to avoid changing mirage. Day one aggregate top scorers were, in target rifle John Moore, who scored the maximum of 200, with 22 centre bulls eyes. The division two winner for the day was Tony Schlink on 195.13 and division three was taken by Graeme Turner with 195.17. F Class Standard A saw Mal Hamilton lead with a creditable 236.20. with F Class Standard B seeing newcomer Anthony Penny from Darling Range shoot a score of 235.16. Wily Bob Kinnear top scored for F Open with a hit of 238.20. Day two carried on from the with Saturday, conditions making the long ranges of 700 metres, 800 metres and 900 metres testing to say the least.

# Hartley Rifle Club Target

At the recent State Championships at Lower Light, the South Australian Rifle Association unveiled the restored Hartley Rifle Club target





donated to them in late 2016. The restoration work and mounting was undertaken by Cold Logic Pty Ltd, industrial refrigeration experts, of Port Adelaide.

The Salem (German) Rifle Club was formed around 1880 and fired on the range set up on Mr T Jaensch's property at Salem. The Club ran its own Kingship (Open Prize Meeting) and club members participated

at other Kingships run by clubs throughout the Adelaide Hills.

The target used was a cast iron disc with 10 scoring rings and a steel centre piece with a further three scoring rings. The centre ring (worth 13 points) was reported to be about the size of a five shilling piece (38 mm). The distance fired was 200 yards.

In 1894, the club shifted its range to Mr H Harvey's property at Hartley and the club name changed to Hartley Rifle Club.

The first competition for the Hartley Rifle Club was held on November 5, 1894 and was won by Mr CH Hutson, who for his five shilling entry fee won the princely sum of eight shillings and six pence.



The Club continued competitions until at least 1901, when the last newspaper report on the club can be found. Members of this club also joined the Murray Bridge Defence Rifle Club (which had sub-branches at Callington and Monarto), with Mr BA Stein and Mr JB Sanders both becoming Murray Bridge club champions.

The target was rescued, after being partly buried for some years on the farm property of Max S Samuels at Hartley, by Dr Allan Robertson, Terry Brown and Bryan Robertson. Unfortunately, the steel centre piece has been lost. We thank all of the people involved in preserving a piece of our sporting history.



SARA would like to thank everyone who helped in preparing the range, organising and running of the Queens. Once again it was a very successful event with lots of fun and good shooting had by all.







Australian representative shooter Darren Enslin showed his class in collecting a trophy double against high quality competition at the 2017 Bundaberg Burnett Rifle Club Open Prize Meeting.





## Vale Adrian Hobbs

1932 - 2017



It is with sadness and disbelief I report the sudden death of South Australia's longest participating member, Adrian Hobbs (joining in 1948 at the age of 16).

Adrian passed away quietly and quickly in the presence of his family at the Royal Adelaide Hospital on Friday April 28 (the day after his 85th birthday), after being diagnosed with aggressive leukaemia only days earlier.

It is difficult to believe that only the week prior he lamented there had not been time to reassemble his 5.56 in time for Saturday's shoot.

Adrian was born in Maylands, Adelaide on April 27, 1932 to Florence and Arnold.

He married Joan in 1953 and as an electrician soon moved from Adelaide to the South Australian countryside. Firstly, he moved to Port Augusta and joined their Rifle Club. A few years later saw another move to Berri and the Barmera rifle Club. Some more years and their final move was to the Morgan district where he served as the Superintendent of the Morgan-

Whyalla pipeline for the Engineering and Water Supply Department of the South Australian Government until retirement in 1989. During this period Adrian belonged to the Goodwood United Rifle Club at the Dean Rifle Range; some 160 kilometres from home.

Following the Dean Range closure, he joined the Waikerie Rifle Club and remained their solitary prone shooter to the very end.

In 1968, he joined the Morgan Smallbore rifle club - fulfilling every role the Club could offer and an integral member contributing to the Club's success and survival. Only in recent years did he succumb to the Scope and Bench Rest mantra with the .22.

Certainly, fullbore target shooting was his passion and dedication reaps its rewards, as success was no stranger.

In 1951, aged 19 he gained selection with the South Australian State Team, followed by an additional 13 selections; the last in 1989.

Additionally, during this period he was

selected by the NRAA to compete at Bisley, Canada and New Zealand with the Australian Team.

At the personal level, the highlights have to be number one badge at SARA's 1963 and 1966 Queens while a member of the Barmera Rifle Club.

The trophy cabinet is not shy of content and ashamedly the number of Queens badges has not been counted, but conservatively must number greater than 60.

In later times, team shooting came to the fore once again with the South Australian Veterans Rifle Association. He was selected on two occasions, representing Australian Veterans teams competing in South Africa and Perth.

Adrian was President of South Australian Veterans for ten years and was recognised last year with Life Membership.

Without doubt team shooting was his predilection - always keen to promote and participate - a component that he was happy to share.

Naturally there were other activities: cars, tennis, gardening and fishing. In his youth, he learnt to play the Piano Accordion, and as years advanced the skill correspondingly diminished, however it was a potent tool to nudge visitors who might just be staying a bit too long.

In recent years the annual trip to Tumby Bay became a firm favourite - shooting and fishing with Gordon and Margaret Harrison, how good can it get?

Adrian was simply the epitome of the dedicated shooter; indifferent scores or stray shots were simply not tolerated. It simply meant another theory or trip to the lathe was necessary to rectify the matter. Many a rifle stock surrendered its life to the persistent whittling and reshaping.

Adrian is survived by Joan, daughter Deborah, sons Garry and Roger, Sonin-law Henry, two grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

A sad loss to his family, numerous friends scattered throughout Australia and the shooting fraternity.

Gone, but never forgotten.


