Should you not have access to a computer please arrange for someone in your Club or family or the local library to get you access so that you can read or browse.

The final elimination for the Australia Cup has been finalised at Belmont. As was part of the rules of the contest the five top finalists would be eligible to be selected as the representatives for Australia in Full Bore Rifle Shooting for the Commonwealth Games in 2018. The five shooters are Jim Bailey, Ben Emms, Peter Thurtell. James Corbett and Matthew Pozzebon.

Their names have been ratified by Shooting Australia and the final selection will then be made. NRAA is part of the process brought upon the sport by the number of challenges to selection brought on during the lead up to the Rio Olympics, not only with shooting but also in swimming and other sports.

It is expected that Jim Bailey and Ben Emms will be the athletes ably supported by high profile coach Stuart Collings.

Geoff Grenfell who was a part of the final Australia Cup elimination blitzed the field at the NRAA National Championships last month winning the Presidents, Queens and obviously, the Grand Aggregate. The results are listed in this edition of ATR and are also able to be viewed online from the NRAA website.

The F Class contingent of the Australian Teams will be competing at Ottawa in Canada in the near future. Their training and preparation has been long and thorough.

Some volunteers from shooting - in its wider aspects - have now commenced the selection process for assisting at the Games next year. The process would appear to be slow and tedious.

State Championships will be conducted by QRA at Belmont in August, NSWRA at Malabar in early September followed by the inaugural Championships by WARA at the new Pinjar range north of Perth. Endeavour to support your own championships at least.

Continue to go out shooting, assist where you can and put a good spin on our sport. Get over any complaints and enjoy shooting with your mates.

# Jim Bailey Scores Australia Cup Win



Sydney shooter Jim Bailey has won a dramatic final Australia Cup selection trial for the 2018 Commonwealth Games at Belmont Range in Brisbane.

Jim, from Holsworthy Rifle Club, shot all 15 bullseyes

for a possible score of 75 on the last range at 1000 yards. This vaulted him from third to first place with a two day aggregate score of 662 with 70 centre bulls.

Ben Emms from Lyndhurst Rifle Club, west of Bathurst in NSW, also scored 662 but with 61 centres, he placed

Peter Thurtell from Wingham was a single point behind in third, with an aggregate 661.71.

Victorian James Corbett, a member of the last Commonwealth team, finished fourth on 660.61 with Queensland University's Matt Pozzebon in fifth placing on 656.62.

The names of the top five finalists will be submitted to Shooting Australia for ratification of the two members and a reserve to compete at the games on Belmont Range next April.

The final two-day selection trial was conducted over 10 ranges from 300 to 1000 yards with 10 and 15 shot matches.

Jim Bailey is an experienced international competitor who coached the Australian team which competed in South Africa earlier this year.

He has been a member of Australian teams since 2001 and has won 11 Queens Prize matches - the most recent in New Zealand in January.

Jim said it has been a lifelong goal to qualify for his first Commonwealth Games and he was looking forward to representing his country in Brisbane next year - a range he has become very familiar with over the years.

"Rifle shooting is very much a part of our family, Jim

His father Ron was a lifelong competitor and NSW representative and his son Mitchell, 19, is currently representing Australia in the Junior Small Bore World Championships in Germany.

As Ben Emms was growing up he never had to travel far to shoot, with the Lyndhurst Range built on the family cattle property in central western NSW.

"I'm a fifth generation shooter. The range has been on our property since 1913." said Ben who combines farming with a stock and station agency business.

Ben won the World Championship in the USA in 2015 after having taken out the US Open title the year before.

A regular member of the Australian team, Ben has won a single Queens Prize in North Queensland.

Both Jim and Ben are competing for selection in the Palma World Championship to be held in New Zealand in early 2019.



### Geoff Grenfell adds another Queens to his Tally

Prolific rifle shooting championship winner Geoff Grenfell has won the  $46^{th}$  National Championship in style in Brisbane.

The Victorian shooter from Bendigo made the most of great weather conditions to shoot a possible 500 score over three days of competition at Belmont.

New South Wales shooter Duncan Davies was hot on his heels also scoring 500, but losing the Queens Prize by three centre bulls.

Geoff Grenfell missed just a single bullseye in five days of competition to win the grand aggregate for the Presidents Match and the Queens with a total of 849.112.







The winds were light to begin with, however the real challenge was that they insisted on cycling through centre at least once for almost every shooter, and repeated this cycle again at each range. The fickle winds made conditions challenging, and identifying the subtle signs that the wind was in flux and therefore either pausing for, or anticipating, the change was the key to good scores.

Sighting was an interesting challenge too. Given the weather, the ground had absorbed a significant amount of water. Now that the sun was out, that water was being baked out of the earth creating HEAVY mirage. Unsurprisingly, the heaviest mirage was in the middle of the day at 800 metres, with scoped shooters having to reduce zoom considerably to cope. As the sun passed its zenith, the sighting eased slightly for the last range of the day, being 900 metres, but sighting and wind

conditions kept competitors on their toes and there were certainly no "gimmies".

There was definitely no shortage of interesting and amiable people in attendance to make it a great event.

As always, the NQRA held its AGM co-incident with the Queens. This AGM was significant in that life membership was to be bestowed upon Chairman Bruce Scott. Not such an easy feat when one has to create a diversion to get the chairman himself out of the meeting so that a vote on the matter may be taken. Bruce's wife Sue was able to concoct a story of a car key broken in a lock to create the diversion which Bruce just absolutely, positively had to address <a href="right now">right now</a>, but truth be known, I think the jig was up. Bestowing the honour of Life Membership on Bruce was a well-deserved recognition of both the hard work and dedication Bruce has put into the association over many, many years and of a lifetime of active competition at the highest levels.

To commemorate the 130th NQRA Queens Prize, the NQRA had some special treats in store for competitors. The NQRA funded a wonderful dinner and all attendees and partners were invited to feast on two suckling pigs slowly cooked on spit roasts throughout the day. In total, slightly over 200 people were at this special event. Following dinner, the entertainment commenced. This comprised of a wiry old local "Bushy" crooning through a selection of old Ocker songs. His dulcet" voice mercifully assisted by guitar and banjo. To complement the show, he also had a few rabbit traps for the crowd to pass around and play with. Surprisingly,

there were no reports of any missing fingers after the show, and seeing the "festive" way some of the people were handling them, I'd say that was a minor miracle. Later in the evening the celebrations migrated to the central fire. Unless you've attended and been a part of an NQRA Queens you will never really know the good times, general ribbing and fun which typically happens around the Hervey's Range central camp fire, but it was aptly summed up by Mark Azzopardi when he remarked "you won't come back the same way you went in..."

Then it was Sunday and the final day of the Queens dawned to another fine day. There was still significant dampness in the earth from the deluge on Friday, and as such as the day warmed up, sighting and mirage were again going to be significant challenges. In the same fashion as every other morning, Jim Blomfield rose early (around 4am it was said) to pay homage to the caffeine deity, get the urns going and whip himself up a brew. Many thanks also go to June Lorimer who





was there not long after to make sure supplies were stocked and ready for the ensuing gaggle of shooters also after their own morning brew.

Given the challenges of sighting, variable winds and the long ranges shot on the final day, it turned out that there were birds aplenty. There were a total of 14 shooters who shot a single bird. But, there were 10 shooters who shot two birds! Whilst there was no one who shot three birds there was one person who managed four. The Bird Award is always a light hearted and fun little stitch-up, and this year the award and associated "bragging rights" went to Graham Aitchison. Whilst this award is always tongue in cheek, on a more serious note, given the volume of birds shot this year, it is a very good barometer of the testing conditions.

The day was not without its other challenges as well. In the pressure cooker of top level competition, one of our upper echelon shooters was having some troubles with a pair of misses. On closer inspection, he was able to confirm that he had wound down from 800 metres to 900 metres instead of up. Clearly when the field is tight and competition is stiff it is important to keep your "game face" on and I hope he doesn't mind me mentioning this so that others might be wary. In another occurrence, Jordan Drew was having trigger troubles. Given the wet weather earlier, some damp clothes were left in his car overnight as was the rifle. During the night, the humidity in the car caused some light surface rust to form in the delicate trigger mechanism, causing just enough friction to render it unusable. It was really heartening to see fellow competitors from all disciplines rally to assist Jordan in rectifying the issue and Jordan went on to complete the Queens, finishing in a respectable third place in FTR. The circumstances leading to this surface rust were very unique and are worthy of mention as a heads up. Beyond the competition, Trevor Deed searched hard and managed to find some particularly boggy ground, promptly getting firmly stuck. Thanks must go to Dudley Ford for providing a most graceful extraction only breaking one of Trevor's spotlights in the process. The peanut gallery watching were certain that given a little more time and planning, the pair could have easily achieved a second breakage.



Crows Nest shooter Ashley Bidgood just prevailed in the hotly contested 2017 Ipswich Open Prize Shoot.


Ashley set the pace with a strong performance to finish just one shot down on 149 with 17 centres and watched several contenders falter on the final 800 metre range in good shooting conditions.




Philip Brook from Brisbane was happy with his winning form in FTR, in which he finished just one shot down on 179.23.







#### **Submission Guidelines**

Australian Target Rifle Magazine welcomes contributions covering shooting events, topics of relevance to target shooting and technical articles.

Submitting material is easy – just email some text to

atr\_editorial@nraa.com.au.

#### Requirements

All written material should be sent as plain text. No tables, headings or spreadsheets are needed - just a basic word document or email is best. All headings, tables and formatting are added in later as part of the typesetting process. Text in Times New Roman font at 12 point is preferred.

Photographs should be sent as a .jpg or .tiff format and can be submitted either as a separate attachment to an email or on CD mailed directly to the ATR Post Office Box. Please provide captions for all photographs – either as the filename of the photograph or listed in the report. Do not embed photographs into documents as this renders the photograph unusable for publication.

#### **Prize Meetings**

Reports of any shooting events should include details of where and when the event was held, the conditions and competitors on the day and a summary of key scores such as aggregates. Additional material regarding the equipment used by the winners and photographs of the event are also welcome.

#### Queens Prizes

Reports of Queens Prizes should include information about the conditions and competitors, the lead-up,

Queens, teams and other associated events. Scores should be provided for all badge winners and included in the report as text. (i.e. Not in table or spreadsheet form).

Good photographs allow us to feature an event. Cameras should be set at as high a resolution as possible. It is often advisable to have more than one photographer and to include a variety of photographs by email or CD including shots of: the range, the competitors, the winners and trophies. Presentation photographs can also be included, but often the presentation area has poor lighting and doesn't allow adequate time to set up good photographs for publication purposes, so additional photographs of the event can be important.

#### Cover photographs

Photographs suitable for a cover should be provided at very high resolution. (300 dpi and 2Mb or above). When taking cover photographs, consider the framing of the photograph with the subject in the foreground and allowing some background (sky or range) for the positioning of the ATR banner.

#### **Deadlines**

Think ahead. Good publishing is all about planning. If you are advertising an event, it can be helpful to prepare and submit advertising material up to four months ahead. This allows time for the editing and publication process and assists readers to plan their attendance at your event. Deadlines for the next two issues of ATR are published in the front of each magazine.

Contributions to ATR are genuinely appreciated and these guidelines are intended to assist in making the process as easy as possible.
