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Chairman's Message

The Ladies National Teams Championship will be conducted at Belmont in conjunction with the National Queens Series in June 2018. The Matches celebrate fifty years since the inaugural event. By then it is planned to invite participants from prior years at a dinner along with the Trophy Presentations.

In April the Commonwealth Games shooting events were competed for at Belmont with all types of shooting contested. Fullbore Target Rifle, Pistol, Clay Target, Smallbore and Air Rifle events were showcased. Ben Emms and Jim Bailey, Australia's representatives had been spending quite an amount of time practising at home, at Belmont and other places under the tutelage of the Team Coach, Stuart Collings. Wishing them the very best in their shooting, the results were Silver to Jim in the individual and a ninth placing to Ben. David Luckman from England took Gold and Parag Patel from England was awarded the Bronze. In the pairs the placings were taken by England, Wales and Scotland.

There are a significant number of Games volunteers who have assisted in the running of the events. The practical problem for the volunteers is just getting to the venue and returning home. It would seem that the bureaucrats have not actually gone outside their offices to see how the public transport system operates. The restrictions placed on travel are significant and a cause of major stress levels on the volunteers.

SARA will be hosting the National Veterans Teams Matches during the time of their own State Championships in May. Any State who still wishes to be a part of the competition will be able to enter should that be their desire.

As an extension of the normal functions of the NRAA. at the invitation of the Tasmanian Rifle Association, I attended a Council meeting in Launceston on Sunday 18 March. TRA is facing a difficult time of it and have done for a number of years now. The main areas of concern are membership not expanding, resulting in a strain on finances and administration; and the loss of rifle ranges around the State. Unfortunately, as in all State Associations there are members who pick faults in personnel and procedures with implications of incompetence and even fraud. This type of person should put their hand up to be part of Council and perhaps propose a solution to what they see as the problems. Should there be implications of fraud or missing funds, then provided there is sufficient evidence of the claim - take the matter to the Police to be followed up.

Shooting Australia has recommended that all types of shooting take part in a "Come and Try" day any time in May. Details of the event are to be found at your own State Association or at Shooting Australia. Take it up and register to make this a memorable occasion and a possibility of attracting additional members.

"There is no such thing as a new idea. It is impossible. We simply take a lot of old ideas and put them into a sort of mental kaleidoscope. We give them a turn and they make new and curious combinations. We keep on turning and making new combinations indefinitely; but they are the same old pieces of coloured glass that have been in use through all the ages." - Mark Twain

If this is true then how does a rifle club, DRA, State or National sporting body deliver more members or increase participation by existing members when there are no new ideas. Of course, the answer is that we do as Twain says, "take a lot of old ideas and put them into a sort of kaleidoscope...and they make new and curious combinations".

In the world of fashion, advertising and promotions, a casual observation by anyone over the age of 60, of which there are many target shooters, will know that with the new ideas of fashion whether it be wide ties, narrow ties, pointed toe shoes, mini skirts, long skirts, long hair or short hair, the cycles of trends repeat themselves. So why as a sport are we not applying the experience of past ideas to give them a turn and present them in a different and creative way to bring a new life to the sport?

One reason might be that change is something that takes effort and willingness to accept. But remember, change brings life and happiness. Remember what a pacemaker does for those who have them, or heart, lung and kidney transplants and antibiotics to name a few. These inventions and discoveries came about because the search for change and discovery to find why and then why not, were taken to a successful result - which I suspect has delivered many a shooter further time to enjoy their sport.

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So, to help the sport rediscover old ideas and present them differently so more people participate in this sport, consider the list of what you can do to make successful change to your club:

- 1. Review your next prize meeting and consider what you are offering. If your numbers are the same each year, seriously consider changing what you are offering. Add a component to spice it up. It does not have to be a change to distance, no. of shots etc but how about mixing Target Rifle, F Classes or different club members together rather than the one club. This might well ensure there is a greater sharing of social and shooting experiences.
- 2. Review your graphics presentation of the event. My observations are that most clubs do not change their invitation except for the date; and colour almost seems an unknown concept.
- 3. Do not rely on broad advertising through existing channels such as Target Rifle Magazine and State websites. Continue using them but develop your data base to all clubs and your existing range membership. Ensure you repeat your advertising at least three times when initiated by your club or organising committee.
- 4. Consider your promotional strategy if you have one. Have you changed what you offer competitors in terms of prizes? Have you included a special teasing prize which is almost too good to believe but unless a person asks or comes to the event they will never know if it is real or not?
- 5. Give a gift to every person who participates and promote it in your flyer. But maybe don't say what it is. Make it a surprise. Make sure the gift is related to your event and those likely to attend. Remember you must consider all ages and all classes of participants. Consider giving prizes to non-participants such as family members who always are left out. Reflect on just who your target market is and who has influence over the decision to attend a prize meeting, if your objective is to get more people there. It might be a family, partner

or business effect has as much influence as the competitor. All this helps make your place of sport be a welcoming and friendly place to visit.

- 6. Make sure the place you have your event at is presented in a welcoming, colourful and positive way. Ranges are usually mowed, tidied and made ready for BBQs, presentation and a drink after the event. But do you have a colourful welcome banner out? Do you have a welcome greeting group of people who are given the task of ensuring every attendee is made very welcome? Remember the last time you were given an unconditional greeting anywhere and what that made you feel and do. I bet you went back, or at least gave it a continued good wrap to those closest to you for some time afterwards.
- 7. When you have an event, make sure you gather the first and last name, mobile and landline number and address of each person. This is obvious but what do you do with this information after the event? Make sure you follow up with a quarterly email (or other timing as appropriate) with an informative flyer, bringing your activities and future invitations to them.

Make sure you implement a personal email campaign for the next event and give the potential participant an offer to encourage them to come.

Don't rely on the idea they came last time and they'll come again.


This says you care and are inviting to them to return and not just to the annual event. Your website, Facebook or direct email communication to participants is an essential vehicle of communication.


- 8. Change your offer at each event. The shooting might remain the same but the way you present it and the social activity offers after shooting activities, can and should change.
- 9. During the event, interview competitors and visitors. Use your phone to video the comments from people. Get their testimonials. Some clubs have done this and in regional parts the local newspaper and TV will take it up.
- 10. Ask a professional event, Public Relations or marketing person to help. They can make all the difference, even if there is a small cost. Offer them a day on the range if they are not a shooter.

When all ten to do's are implemented, you are guaranteed to increase your event participation numbers. This has been experienced by one DRA with over 30% participation increase in their prize meetings when creative, colourful and well communicated information was delivered to a wide potential audience.

Whatever you decide to do you must PROMOTE, PROMOTE to make it successful.

121st Tasmanian Queens Prize

The 121st Tasmanian Queens Prize Meeting was held from March 8 – March 12, 2018 in almost perfect weather for the six ranges of the lead-up David Llewellyn Series and the ten ranges of the Queens. However, gentle variable winds were the norm, varying in both strength and direction with quite a few ranges involving fishtails from the north east to south east. The range faces directly south. This did create perhaps more issues for competitors than the strong westerly (3 o'clock) winds normally encountered, due to the rapidity with which changes were happening.

Entries were again down from the previous year, despite the return to the six range lead up. For competitors bringing handloads to compete in all the competitions, planning and coordination with other competitors

coming from the mainland is suggested in order to freight reloads across Bass Strait at a reasonable cost (information is available on the TRA website).

Our SMT targets were again used throughout the prize meeting and again performed exceptionally well. An issue identified is that the tablets may be hard to read due to the ever-present sun in the northern sky facing directly onto them. This is something that the Association is working to correct with more shade. More and more competitors are using their own tablets etc, which are usually of better screen brightness and quality than the Association can afford!

The David Llewellyn Series was shot over the six ranges of 500, 600, 700, 800, 900 and 1,000 yards in very settled and calm conditions.

All were 15 shot matches on day one, starting at 1000 yards. The weather was fine with a light breeze going across the range. By days end all shooters had to work hard for their scores.

In Match Rifle Open at 1000 yards, Peter Maher from Victoria was top with 75-08, next was Paul Monaghan from Tasmania on 74-09. In Match Rifle Reserve, David Rich was the victor with 74-06, next was Mark Walters of Tasmania on 73-07. In F Open Long Range, Terry Sheedy from Townsville Marksman, Queensland was top with 89 followed on 80 by Neville McKinnell. One shooter in FTR was Alan Routledge, who recorded a score of 78.

In F Open Long Range success went to Terry Sheedy 239 followed by Neville McKinnell 213. In FTR Alan Routledge recorded an aggregate score of 211.

Day Two saw much better shooting conditions, with just a gentle breeze across the range. There were two 15 shot matches and one 20 shot match at 1200 yards. At the first range in Match Rifle Open, Paul Monaghan was in good form with 75-11 and next was Shane Courtney with 75-08. At 20x the reticle lines subtend 2.5mm at 100m, which is fine enough for accurate shot placement without being too difficult to see, and fifteen indicator markings, evenly spaced 1-MOA apart, run along the full length of each crosswire from centre. 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





Match Rifle in Australia - Commemorating 25 Years

The 2018 Australian Match Rifle and Long Range F Class Championships to be held in Coonabarabran (NSW) in October this year, will mark 25 years of National Match Rifle competition in Australia.

The first Australian Match Rifle Championships were held at the Woomera Rifle Range in South Australia from October 6-9, 1993 with 36 hardy Australians and two brave Englishmen lining up for the competition.

Below, James Freebairn (founding President and Honorary Life Member of the Australian Match Rifle Association), shares his memories of this inaugural competition.

"It was held on the Woomera Rifle Club range, which is on the former Australian Woomera Rocket Research facility, about 20 kilometres North West of the town on the original 'G Range' of the rocket era. Leftover buildings of use were the Mess Hall, showers and toilets, as well as a shed suitable for target making and storage. The aspect of the range was east to west which caused problems about mid-afternoon when the sun shone directly into sights and spotting scopes. Shooting was planned to be over for the day by then.

The range is situated on a piece of flat desert country with gibbers, small salt bush and no trees. Tony Hoare (AMRA Hon. Life Member) and helpers were able

to have the range enlarged from the original four targets up to 1000 yards, to 10 targets up to 1200 yards. Among the 40 or so competitors were NRAA Chairman, Alistair McPherson; Deputy Chairman, Colin Kuchel; Philip Saul (a back-gunner), who at the time was Treasurer of NRAGB; and Michael Davis (also from England) who was a front-gunner and the only shooter with a telescopic sight.

Alistair McPherson, on behalf of NRAA, welcomed everybody and then fired the opening shot.

The three classes of competitors included Open Match Rifle under the same rules as present, with shooters using bullets such as 185gn Berger, 155gn Sierra, 168gn Sierra and others. Suitable projectiles were not readily available, so whatever could be obtained was used. Reserve grade had the same rules as Open Match Rifle but was restricted to Australian B and C graders. B Class was for those shooting ADI 144gn bullets, which was standard for Target Rifle shooting at the time.

The desert wind that blows from the north and then from the south, usually vigorously, created havoc several times.



Day 1: a light North Wester,

Day 2: a solid North Wester out to 20 minutes with Berger 185gn and much more with ADI 144's. An extra target was put up to allow all competitors the opportunity to aim off an extra 12 feet, as many of the iron sights wouldn't turn far enough.

Day 3: a very strong North Wester (and hot). Shooting was abandoned halfway through the first range (1200 yards) because conditions in the pit were not safe, with targets breaking. Michael Davis came off the mound and said "that is enough wind, I am convinced".

Day 4: came with a solid southerly in which 1000 yards and 1100 yards were completed, but at 1200 yards nobody could get a hit, even with lots of help from the markers. So, that range was reshot at 1000 yards.

No matter the conditions, we had winners - Match Rifle Open: Peter Robinson (Canberra Rifle Club, ACT); Match Rifle Reserve: Trevor Haythorpe (Adelaide Rifle Club, SA.); Class B Geoff Ayling (Metropolitan Rifle Club, SA).

After the individual matches, the inaugural Freebairn Teams of four competition was shot. This should have been at 1200 yards, but because of the rude weather was pruned to 10 shots to count with two sighters and fired at 1000 yards. The winning team was Reg Rowlands, Bill Martin, Peter Robinson and Geoff Ayling.

When the shooting was done, the competition was completed with the presentation dinner at the Woomera Hotel where the woes of the previous days were talked about or forgotten, but the congenial company was enjoyed. During the evening the markers and Stan Edwards (NRAA Chief Range Officer at the time) wrote

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The whole system operated perfectly when it was placed into storage. It should be noted all parts of the system were stored in a closed weatherproof shed and container when not in use.. We are happy to talk through processes needed to keep the system operational.

Full price is \$20,000 and represents a very cheap way a club can obtain a fully operational electronic target system.

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a poem relevant to this shoot, which was presented to the gathering and received with much hilarity.

From this event, Match Rifle in Australia has grown to where there are now State Championships held annually in five States - Victoria, South Australia, New South Wales, Tasmania and Queensland - in addition to the National Championships. These provide high level competition throughout the year for long range enthusiasts.

In 1997, the first International Match Rifle competition was held in Australia with Great Britain sending a team to Tasmania to compete against Australia for the inaugural Woomera Trophy. The 8th Woomera Trophy competition between Australia and Great Britain is coming up in 2019 with a 16-person Australian Match Rifle Team heading for Bisley in the United Kingdom in July next year.

In 1997, the inaugural State Teams event for Match Rifle, the Rowland's Trophy (four shooters over three ranges), was also introduced and this was followed by the introduction in 2008 of the Maloney State Match Rifle Team Trophy (four shooters, no sighters at 1200 yards). In 2011, the Mincham Aggregate Trophy was introduced as the aggregate trophy for the Rowlands and Maloney event. The donors of these trophies, Reg Rowlands, Ken Maloney and Graham Mincham, were all competitors in the inaugural 1993 competition and strong supporters of the development of Match Rifle shooting in Australia.

In 2000, Long Range F Class was introduced to the National Championships held in Queensland with Ken Larkin, John Skinner and Andrew Larkin being the inaugural F Open competitors in the Nationals. In 2013, the first State Teams competition for long range F Open was held and in the same year the individual competition was expanded to include long range FTR.

Talking to some of those early match rifle competitors it is obvious how much the sport's equipment, skills and knowledge base has developed over the past 25 years. Compared with the 1993 shooters using their standard target rifle (13" twist with peep sights), today's Match Rifle shooters are generally using a 9 or 10" twist barrel with 20+ power telescopic sights. From the old stuffed chaff bag being used as a rest for the front hand, there are now a wide variety of front rests in use – from the simple to the sophisticated – but suffice to say, anything that can provide a level of stability and some height adjustment will get you started.

The discussion on best bullet weight and projectiles to use back to 1200 yards is still being debated for hours! Generally though, most are using upwards of 210 or 215 gr projectiles with a powder combination to give velocities of > 2650fps muzzle velocity.

One of the major positives coming from match rifle shooting is improved wind reading. Practicing at distances back to 1200 and even 1500 yards, hones wind reading skills like nothing else! As shooters 25 years ago quickly discovered, even small wind changes at these distances can easily take you off target. Whilst

the 1993 event was shot in some pretty 'atrocious' conditions, other years at other venues have been equally challenging (we all know what Campbell Town and Lower Light can blow like) yet overall scores show how the shooting standard is steadily improving.

The next Australian Match Rifle and Long Range F Class Championships will be held at Coonabarabran in October 2018 with the Individual event going from October 2-5 and teams events held on October 5 and 6. Further details are available through the Match Rifle website at www.matchrifle.org

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

QUEENSLAND WEAPONS ACT: Persons in possession of firearms must have (and carry at all times) a current firearms licence or 'Visitors Licence' issued by their State or Territory authority. Storage of, or transportation of firearms must be in accordance with the Queensland 'Weapons Act 1990' at all times.

Each competitor MUST sign the Range Register, which is on the first scorecard of the day, each day before they commence their shoot.

AMMUNITION: Loaded ammunition and hand loads in accordance with Standard Shooting Rules must be used in all matches.

MUZZLE ENERGY: It is the Competitor's responsibility to ensure muzzle energy of ammunition used does not exceed 3500 foot pounds (4742.5 joules).

Ammunition & Stores: Ammunition and Stores will be available from the Q Store 30 minutes before shooting commences. The QRA is not permitted to buy back any unused ammunition that was purchased from the Q Store.

Zero Range: The 25 yard zero range will be available from 8.00 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. daily.

GRADING: As per NRAA Standard Shooting Rules for Australian Rifle Clubs as amended - 2018. ALL entrants must produce their Firearms Licence on request.

F Class Standard Grading: F Class Standard competitors will be graded according to NRAA Grading Rules. The QRA reserves the right to split all entries in F class Standard into two equal numbers in each grade if considered necessary.

Range Matches: Shoot offs will not be conducted for individual range awards for the Duncan and Queens range matches. First position in each class will be awarded to all shooters who achieve an equal highest score after count back according to Standard Shooting Rules.

Double Ranges: When a single distance is contested twice consecutively either prior to or after the lunch break, then squads will remain on the same target for both matches but there will be a short break between them. Shooters will advance up the board as with other ranges.

Shooting Benches: Competitors are allowed to shoot off a shooting bench provided they produce an exemption from their state shooting authority. All competitors will be allocated the same target.

Medals: When there are fewer than five shooters in a grade or category, a gold medal only will be awarded, with extra medals determined by entries.

SWDRA Easter Prize Meeting

Sixty shooters and their families converged on the Coolilup Range over the Easter Long weekend to compete in the SWDRA's annual Easter prize meeting.

The South West DRA's program is considered unique in that three separate competitions are conducted simultaneously, with the historic Coolilup Cup being contested over 300, 500 and 600 metres on the Friday; the SWDRA Open Championship on Saturday and Sunday; and with the Service Rifle Championship straddling the Friday and Saturday shoot to incorporate the 300 – 600 metre matches.

Clear blue skies blessed the entire weekend and the daily temperatures were ideal for comfort. Each day presented shooters with a steady and strengthening southerly breeze which, while predominately from the left, had a tendency to fishtail, ensuring shooters needed to keep a sharp weather-eye out, especially at the longer ranges.

The South West's preparation of the range, with significant assistance from the resident caretaker, Barry Griffiths, resulted in a picture perfect sight with manicured green mounds framing seven fully furnished electronic targets that had been renovated and proven for accuracy prior to the competition.

The result was a smooth running meeting, devoid of any queries or complaints regarding the reliability of the scores gained. CRO Wayne Oldfield's management of the meeting in general and any issue that arose with equipment failure or a procedural issue was handled in an efficient and totally professional manner.

The Coolilup Cup

The Coolilup Cup is a one-day competition, fired over 300, 500 and 600 metres. The winner of the main event, the Target Rifle Coolilup Cup was John Moore, taking off the honours for the third time and in this case, for a consecutive win.

Dennis Blechynden took out

Service Rifle Championship

Eleven Service Rifle enthusiasts gathered to shoot for the SWDRA's Service Rifle Championship. This competition was over two days with the day one's course of fire being over 300, 500 and 600 metres and day two consisting of 300, 400, 500 and 600 metres. All competitors in this category are passionate about the discipline in general, and their beloved service firearms in particular.

As in past years Busselton's Jack



Nixon showed good form, running out overall winner. He was seriously challenged on day two by fellow clubmate Julian Davey, who top scored on the day.


SWDRA Open Prize Meeting

The main event of the weekend, the SWDRA's Open Championship was contested over two days, and over seven ranges - 300 to 900 metres. The standard of the competition was high over day one which consisted of the 'shorts'. Leonora's John Moore, fresh from his win in the Coolilup Cup the previous day was the leading target rifle shooter, taking the daily aggregate honours on a count back from Subiaco's Peter Watkins. Both marksmen scored 197.16.

The F Standard top score was achieved by Boddington's Mahlon Reid with a score of 228.11. F Open's daily aggregate winner was Brett Bunyan from Boddington with a score of 236.17 while Bunbury's George Wittorff won the two-man competition in FTR with a score of 210.7.

Day two proved to be more of the same weather-wise, with a mainly left wind breeze, punctuated with the occasional fishtail.

Bright sunny skies and light winds opened the Easter weekend's two days of competition at the Glenrowan Rifle Range in North East Victoria for the 103rd No. 6 Ovens and Murray DRA and Wangaratta Rifle Club open prize meetings on March 31 and April 1, 2018.

On Easter Saturday, 77 shooters from across Victoria, South Australia and New South Wales took to the range for two 500 yard 10 shot matches and a 600 yard 15 shot match. The competition was held on a combination of Hexta electronic and manual targets. There was an excellent display of shooting skills with 11 possible scores from the Target Rifle competitors and 21 from the F Class competitors across the three ranges for the day.

The first 500 yard range, held in gentle early morning conditions saw range winners in Target Rifle A Grade (TRA) Michelle Fletcher 50.8, Target Rifle B Grade (TRB) Peter Kelley 50.5, Target Rifle C Grade (TRC) Brian McKenna 48.2, F Class Standard A Grade (FSA) Trever Rhodes 60.7, F Class Standard B (FSB) Alex Brown 60.5, F Class Open (FO) Robert Bant 60.7 and F Class Target Rifle (FTR) Michael Hall 60.9.

With the wind and mirage conditions picking up for the second 500 yard range of the day, the winners in each class were TRA Brett Thurtell 50.6, TRB Peter Daldy 49.5, TRC Brian McKenna 48.3, FSA Alan Fuge 60.6, FSB Alex Brown 60.4, FO Phil Jonker 60.7 and FTR Michael Hall 60.5.

With scores close and the quality of competition strong across all classes, this left just the 15 shot 600 yard range to sort out the day. As anticipated, after a hotly contested first two ranges of competition, the 15 shot 600 yard range brought

out some of the best in each of the competitors. Winners for the third range were TRA Brett Thurtell 74.7, TRB Doug George 75.8, TRC Brian McKenna 70.4, FSA Colin Firth 89.6, FSB Warwick Sides 85.6, FO Paul Deehan 89.7 and FTR Liam Hall 88.7.

With the three matches completed it was time to tally up the scores and declare the day's winners.

In Target Rifle A Grade, Brett Thurtell from the Wodonga Rifle Club once again proved himself a specialist at the Glenrowan Rifle Range, finishing with a score of 174.17, dropping only a single shot for the entire day. In Target Rifle B

Grade, an excellent final range saw Doug George of the Wangaratta Rifle Club winning the first day's competition with a score of 169.15. In Target Rifle C Grade, Bruce McKenna from Moe City Rifle Club had a big day out, winning all three matches and finishing the day with a score of 169.15.

In F Class, F Standard A saw a three-way tie between Trevor Rhodes, Bob Pederson and Alan Fuge who all finished with a score of 206.16. This led to a shoot off between the three competitors to determine the places taken on the

Hexta Electronic Targets. Trevor Rhodes was the eventual winner of the shoot off despite cross firing a super centre onto Bob's target with one of his sighters.

In F Standard B Grade, David Wallace from the East Central DRA finished strongly to win the grade with a score of 203.14. F Open saw Paul Deehan from Corryong Rifle Club win with a strong third range with a score of 209.18 and in FTR it was Liam Hall finishing well to out shoot his dad for top honours on the day with an aggregate score of 207.17.

There was strong showing from both juniors and veterans on Easter Saturday with Blade Lacey from Maryborough Rifle Club winning with seventh overall in Target Rifle B Grade with a score of 162.11. Alex Brown won top junior in F Standard B Grade, finishing third overall in his grade with a score of 201.10. Liam Hall not only won the day as top FTR shooter, but

also top junior for his class with his excellent score of 207.17. The hotly contested veteran shooter winner for Target Rifle was Shepparton/Nathalia Rifle Club Len Hayes, finishing seventh in Target Rifle A Grade with a score of 170.14 and in F Class it was Wangaratta Rifle Club's own Phil Jonker, finishing fifth in F Open with a score of 205.18.

Easter Sunday greeted the range with more early morning sunshine and 64 keen and enthusiastic participants ready to tackle the three 10 shot matches at ranges of 300, 500 and 600 metres. As per the OMDRA competition the day before, competition was held on a combination of Hexta electronic and manual targets with competitors eager to see if the Easter bunny would bring them joy or whether the April fool was going to spoil their day.

The excellent display of rifle skills continued on Easter Sunday with

another 11 possible scores from the Target Rifle competitors and 18 from the F Class competitors across the three ranges for the day.

In this day and age many fullbore rifle shooters have a view that the shorter ranges are easier with today's modern equipment and advancements in ballistic technology. The 300 metre range was to show that you can never underestimate any range in a prize meeting, especially on the first of April.

The range proved difficult to read for some, whether it was the hard to read the breeze or early morning moisture in the air, with eventual range winners of: TRA Gayle Sewell 50.7, TRB Blade Lacey 50.8, TRC Chris Livingston 47.2, FSA Dean Moore 60.7, FSB Brendan Powell 59.6, FO Phil Jonker 60.4 and FTR Michael Hall 60.6.

With winds still light but increasing and conditions starting to turn overcast, the second range at 500 metres was won by: TRA Peter Maher 50.6, TRB Greg Cavanagh 50.8, TRC Gary Mull 45.2, FSA Jenny Davies 60.7, FSB Brendan Powell 60.4, FO Michelle Giddens 60.8 and FTR Liam Hall 60.4.

The overcast conditions settled in for the afternoon, although still a pleasant mid to high twenty degrees for the third and final range of 600 metres. Competition, much like day one was close and hotly contested. The winners for the third range were TRA Terry Hickey 50.4, TRB Peter Daldy 49.4, TRC Chris Livingston 44.2, FSA Graeme Kerr 58.3, FSB Brendan Powell 58.3, FO Robert Bant 59.6 and FTR Michael Hall 59.4.

With the two days now complete, scores were again tallied and results announced by Wangaratta Club President Ian Sandford, who had worked tirelessly in the background for the two days to ensure a smooth and successful running of the events.

In Target Rifle A Grade, consistent

and strong shooting saw Peter Maher from Lilydale Rifle Club, having not dropped a shot the entire day, ride the winner's chair and receive the Wangaratta belt for the prize meeting with a final score of 150.14. In Target Rifle B Grade, it was Peter Daldy from Karramomus who finished the day on top with a score of 147.14 and in Target Rifle C Grade, Wangaratta's own Chris Livingston won the day with 134.5 - an especially good result since Chris has been away from shooting over the last 12 months and has had limited opportunity to keep up his skills.

Like the first day's competition the F Class competition was also strongly contested with Dean Moore from Lang Lang Rifle Club winning F Standard A with a score of 175.15. In F Standard B Grade, the prize was won by the youngest shooter at the range and Wangaratta Rifle Club member Brendan Powell, winning all three ranges and finishing with a score of 177.13, which not only won him B Grade, would have also won F Standard A Grade on the day; fantastic shooting from the junior shooter. He will keep many an experienced shooter on their toes for years to come.

F Open again proved in this highly competitive class of shooting that to win you have to bring your best. It was South Bendigo's Robert Bant on 179.14 who won, dropping only a single shot for the day's competition. In FTR, it was the father's turn to shine with Michael Hall winning with a score of 179.13.

There was another show of proficiency by the juniors and veterans on Easter Sunday with Blade Lacey from Maryborough Rifle Club the best Target Rifle B Grade junior (fourth overall) with a score of 144.11. Brendan Powell was top junior in F Standard B Grade finishing first overall in his grade with his score of 177.13. Liam Hall showed off his skills finishing second in his grade with 176.10. The veteran winner of Target Rifle was the winner of the day, Lilydale's Peter Maher and in F Class it was South Bendigo Rifle Club member Robert Bant on 179.14 finishing both first in his Grade and top F Class veteran.

The two day aggregate winners saw two junior shooters taking out top honours for the weekend with Brendan Powell in F Class Standard B and Liam Hall in FTR winning with total two-day scores of 377.28 and 383.27 respectively, showing that youth is no barrier to strong results in prize meeting competitions.

Target Rifle A Grade was won by Brett Thurtell on 322.32, narrowly beating Peter Maher with just six centres who finished on 322.26. Target Rifle B Grade was won by Peter Daldy with 315.22 and Target Rifle C Grade was won by Gary Mull, whose consistent shooting over the weekend saw him finish with a 289.14, narrowly beating Bruce McKenna by three centres.

In another narrow victory, Wodonga Rifle Club stalwart Bob Pedersen won F Class Standard A with 380.29 over Alan Fuge from Nagambie Rifle Club who finished on 380.25. In F Open Corryong Rifle Club member Paul Deehan won with 385.35 narrowly beat Greg Warrian from Tumut Rifle Club on 384.30.

We thank all those that supported this year's event and the excellent job done by all made both the Ovens and Murray DRA and Wangaratta Rifle Club proud for their assistance in putting on one of the best target sports events in Victoria.

The winner in Nato class was Anthony Box from Lang Lang, with Spyros Spyro from Lang Lang second and Brian Kirkman from Sydney third.







NQRA History - Progress Report

By Bernie Davis

This article is issued in the interest of keeping people informed of progress relative to NQRA's History project.

Project Workforce and Roles

At the outset of this project, five people were involved namely: Bruce Scott, Bernie Davis, Dick Crozier, Una Glavin and Gail Christie.

Bruce Scott as NQRA Chair heads the project team. Bruce has undertaken to compile the various tables associated with the project and to assemble photographs. Bruce also provides valuable guidance to the team.

Bernie Davis is author of NQRA's History, with the task divided into two sections. Section one involves the actual writing of the document and section two involves research for Chapter Three (firearms and equipment) as well as discussing and compiling contributions to the history project. Time wise the project is demanding - requiring anything from two to six hours per day, seven days per week.

Dick Crozier has provided the main body of research and has done an excellent job. Dick pays much attention to detail, which is imperative in a project of this nature. Without Dick's contribution this project would not have proceeded.

Bob Kennedy generously contributed his time in reviewing Chapter 3 (firearms and equipment) and made a significant and technically informative contribution. John Lorimer made comment relative to the F Class section of this chapter. Una did some early editing of the document. We thank all contributors for their assistance.

Summary of Progress

Four of the seven chapters of NQRA's History are in an advanced state, requiring mainly revision only. In Chapter Two, a small section on Mount Isa needs to be added. Chapter Five covering the achievements of well performed NQRA lady members is in progress,

with a reasonable response from members. The document will be ready for the photographs to be added soon. There is a substantial work load ahead compiling tables which recognise the contribution of past administrators. Footnotes will need further work, which will be another substantial undertaking.

The Various Chapters

There are seven chapters to this book:

Chapter 1. The Formation of NQRA and NQRA Rifle Clubs.

Chapter 2. NQRA Rifle Clubs by District - Past and Present from 1886 to 2017.

Chapter 3. Historical Rifles and Equipment Changes.

Chapter 4. Changes in Membership with Time.

Chapter 5. NQRA Lady Members.

Chapter 6. NQRA Male members.

Chapter 7. Where to from here - future direction.

Chapter one deals with the formation of NQRA which predates WW I. It identifies the first NQRA Chair, Captain (later Major) Henry Haldane and the reason behind the formation of rifle clubs.

Chapter two deals with the location and something of the history of individual rifle clubs across the North's various rifle districts. It also outlines why clubs were established. Over time there have been a total of 93 clubs in North Queensland, most of which were established before WW I.

Chapter three covers changes in rifle technology and equipment over time. It attempts to identify the reasons for changes in rifle technology and who drove those changes. In compiling this chapter an attempt has been made to identify why people moved from one rifle model to the next. It does not try to explain the technical aspects of each firearm in detail. If people want that sort of explanation there

is ample information on the internet. Chapter three also makes comment about the firearms/community relationship. Comments in this area have been presented because this book will be read by the non-shooting public. The message the author wants to convey is that rifle club members are responsible, law abiding members of the community.

Chapter four covers changes in NQRA membership over time. Rifle club numbers have stabilised to a high degree down from a peak of 93 to 13 now. Most of the decline in club numbers occurred soon after the end of WW I. Initially rifle clubs were established by the Army as recruiting venues for WW I. Today club numbers are a better measure of NORA's health. Club numbers are declining slowly and, in this chapter, we have tried to identify why this might have happened. In the absence of definitive information, the suggested reasons are nothing more than speculation.

Chapter five covers the history of lady shooters in NQRA; it's a work in progress. Ladies graced the firing line as far back as the 1880's. Some of the early shooters have been identified. Unfortunately, there is no pictorial record showing the features of early lady shooters. There is one wonderful old photo of a lady shooter in a prone position on the firing line in a long dress. In addition to the full length dress the lady was covered with a blanket from the waist to the ankles. Such were the morals of the day. Profile contributors to NQRA's History will have a head and shoulders photo inserted into the document for future reference.

Bruce Scott has compiled a list of some former and current NQRA lady members with some having been approached to supply their history profile. Some profiles have already been written and returned to contributors for comment.

Chapter six covers some former and current male shooters.



Profile Submissions: To date fourteen people have submitted their history profile. Eight profiles have been written-up. Depending on how much information people provide, it takes a minimum of two days and up to three days to get the job done for each individual. Five people have signalled that they are satisfied with their completed profile. Contact with two persons about their profiles is a work in progress and should be completed shortly.

All profiles are returned to the contributor for checking and sometimes getting things right takes an exchange of several emails. If errors in the content of any individual's profile document are brought to the attention of the author they will be addressed without hesitation.

Contributors will need to acknowledge by emailing Bernie Davis that the final copy of their profile is acceptable to them. In the absence of an acceptance note their profile will not be published. Contributors should contact Bernie Davis, Author NQRA History or Bruce Scott NQRA Chair if they have concerns with any aspect of the history project.

The author, in consultation with Bruce Scott and Dick Crozier has determined the direction the history project has taken. The author also determined the writing style applied to the history document. NQRA's History attempts to capture historical events accurately and deliver these with clarity and a reasonable standard of English. The history team would like to leave the reader with the thought "that was an interesting read" or "I didn't know that" or better still both. Ultimately, the author and NQRA's Chair takes responsibility for the document.

Submitting material is easy – just email some text to atr_editorial@nraa.com.au.

Requirements

All written material should be sent as plain text. No tables, headings or spreadsheets are needed - just a basic word document or email is best. All headings, tables and formatting are added in later as part of the typesetting process. Text in Times New Roman font at 12 point is preferred.

Photographs should be sent as a .jpg or .tiff format and can be submitted either as a separate attachment to an email or on CD mailed directly to the ATR Post Office Box. Please provide captions for all photographs – either as the filename of the photograph or listed in the report. Do not embed photographs into documents as this renders the photograph unusable for publication.

Prize Meetings

Reports of any shooting events should include details of where and when the event was held, the conditions and competitors on the day and a summary of key scores such as aggregates. Additional material regarding the equipment used by the winners and photographs of the event are also welcome.

Queens Prizes

Reports of Queens Prizes should include information about the conditions and competitors, the lead-up, Queens, teams and other associated events. Scores should be provided for all badge winners and included in the report as text. (i.e. Not in table or spreadsheet form).

Good photographs allow us to feature an event. Cameras should be set at as high a resolution as possible. It is often advisable to have more than one photographer and to include a variety of photographs by email or CD including shots of: the range, the competitors, the winners and trophies. Presentation photographs can also be included, but often the presentation area has poor lighting and doesn't allow adequate time to set up good photographs for publication purposes, so additional photographs of the event can be important.

Cover photographs

Photographs suitable for a cover should be provided at very high resolution. (300 dpi and 2Mb or above). When taking cover photographs, consider the framing of the photograph with the subject in the foreground and allowing some background (sky or range) for the positioning of the ATR banner.

Deadlines

Think ahead. Good publishing is all about planning. If you are advertising an event, it can be helpful to prepare and submit advertising material up to four months ahead. This allows time for the editing and publication process and assists readers to plan their attendance at your event. Deadlines for the next two issues of ATR are published in the front of each magazine.

Contributions to ATR are genuinely appreciated and these guidelines are intended to assist in making the process as easy as possible. If you have comments or questions about sending material please contact us at atr_editorial@nraa.com.au for any clarification.

Don milked cows for a living and also reared pigs. He told me he often saved new born pigs with mouth to mouth to get them going.


